Transgender status within the law

- Lilith's presentation in a social, legal and political context
- One transgender person killed every 2 days from 2008-2014 (UNHRC)
- Domestic and international laws have "schizophrenic" view of transgender experiences

Legal issues in Pakistan

- Discrimination in the family, employment, housing, education, healthcare is mutually buttressing
- Pakistan's paradoxical treatment of khwaja siras
- -historical roles of khwaja siras
- -common confusion between biological standing and SOGI demonstrated in Islamic and federal law

Legal issues in Pakistan (ii)

- On the books, Pakistan has some of the best transgender protection laws in the world
- -2009, "X" category on legal documents
- -2009, judicial activism for elections rights
- -ample funding for transgender protections
- Protective organizations

Legal issues in Pakistan (iii)

LIMITS of the law:

- -biology-based definitions
- -misnomers about sharia
- -general distrust of courts
- *Pakistan represents great codified legal progress, but these far outpace social and cultural views*

Legal issues in Europe for khwaja siras

- Lack of domestic evidence of persecution
- "Gender-based" persecution based on "visible" category?
- European asylum question incompatible with Pakistani experiences
- Housing with other cultural members
- Pakistan looks protective (on paper) for asylum assessors
